Revisions to the Guidelines Offense Table, Effective December 1, 2017

The Maryland State Commission on Criminal Sentencing Policy (MSCCSP) has revised the Guidelines Offense Table to reflect:

- (1) the addition of methamphetamine as an example of a Schedule I through V non-narcotic drug with a seriousness category classification IV for distribution, PWID, and manufacture;
- (2) classification of new and amended offenses passed during the 2017 Legislative Session (summarized in the tables below); and
- (3) updates to the statutory code source for motor vehicle offenses pursuant to the recodification of these laws in SB 165, Chapter 55.

These changes were adopted in the Code of Maryland Regulations (COMAR) **effective December 1, 2017**.
